"Genealogy in Iceland"

While returning recently from a trip to Europe, my wife and I stopped off for three days to visit the country of Iceland. We learned there is a complete computer database of the genealogy of all the inhabitants of Iceland where there are 435 family lines. When Icelanders meet they don't talk about the weather or sports but they talk about how they are related. This database consists of the medical records of each inhabitant. Some families are known to have certain medical problems with one family having a history of strokes, another a history of cancer etc. With the discovery of DNA, the Iceland Health Organization can now predict necessary treatment before a medical problem surfaces. Using genealogy, the World Health Organization can now apply this knowledge to family lines in other countries. Thanks to Iceland, this world is a better place. Incidentally, I looked in various phone books, but to no avail, to find any Overholt listings. I guess we are not from a Viking heritage!



WHO IS INCOMPETENT?

Several years ago, a man wrote asking for help in tracing his family and requested to be put on the mailing list. I explained that his family name was not a variation of the Oberholtzer name but I would put him on the list. This year he wrote to our president, our treasurer and to me asking to be removed from the mailing list because he found he was tracing the wrong family. Why write to the three of us? He evidently felt that two of us were incompetent but he didn't know which two!

THE CENSUS

The 1930 census was made available to the public for the first time on April 1st. I recently was asked to check the 2000 census for a member of the Association who was trying to find a relative. I explained that due to circumstances beyond my control that I would not be here in the year 2072 to do that census. The census is only open to the public after 72 years.

FITTING PIECES OF THE PUZZLE TOGETHER

On October 1, 1898, the Oberholtzer's of Allen County, Indiana held their first reunion at the home of William and Matilda (Myers) Oberholtzer in Springfield Twp, Allen Co.(1) They were the descendents of [JC] Jacob Oberholtzer 1767-1847, a Mennonite minister who married first Catharina Bachman and had 7 children. He married the second time Elizabeth Mellinger with whom he had 14 children. [JC15] Jacob, who was born 1800 Northampton Co (now Lehigh Co) PA and died 1845 in Waterloo, DeKalb Co IN, was the fifth child by the first marriage. Reunion records show his children were Mary, Rebecca, Isaiah, Samuel and Daniel. Jacob is said to have married first "unknown" with his second marriage to Susannah Mellinger. I became interested in this family when I heard from George Boyle of Erlanger KY who was related to Isaiah. In the DeKalb County census, I had found Rebecca, Isaiah and Lydia living with different families in 1850 and Elizabeth Oberholtzer, age 33, was with Susanna 6 and Daniel 4 in Smithfield Twp, DeKalb. I was interested in finding that a Cornelius Widner had married 2/10/1852 Elizabeth Oberholtzer in DeKalb Co where today dedicated volunteers have transcribed many records that are a tremendous help to researchers. I decided to see what I could find on Cornelius Widner and in the 1850 census Union Twp, DeKalb Co, he is age 49 with no wife and five children. Who was the Elizabeth Oberholtzer that Cornelius married? I found another write-up about John Lutz who married 3/21/1868 Susanna Oberholtzer in DeKalb and she is said to be the daughter of Jacob Oberholtzer and Elizabeth Gingrich. This changes the order of Jacob Oberholtzer's wives. His first wife was Susannah Mellinger and his second wife Elizabeth Gingrich.

I then thought I should try to find Cornelius Widner in the 1860 DeKalb census (2) to see what the age of his wife Elizabeth was. I went through 10 townships with no luck and on the 11th, with my patience was running out, I found the family on the very last page and the name was spelled WEILNER! If Cornelius' name had been John, I never would have found them. Elizabeth's age is given as 44 and living next door is Samuel Gingrich age 37 who was no doubt her brother. I have done enough census work to know that it is very difficult to read the handwriting of some of the census takers. Cornelius' wife Elizabeth is the widow of Jacob Oberholtzer and the mother of Daniel Oberholtzer and possibly Susannah.

In checking for Cornelius Widner in the DeKalb Co Web Site I found UNION TOWNSHIP REAL ESTATE TRANSFERS, DeKalb Co IN (3) which started in 1865. I decided to see what I could find of interest and I went page after page until I found the name Jacob Oberholtzer in 1868 and this deed gave the names of his children. "John, Jacob, Samuel Lutz convey all the rights & interest of Lydia, Rebecca, Sarah, Samuel, Isaiah, Susannah and Daniel Oberholtzer, heirs of Jacob Oberholtzer dec'd". I would assume that they had to wait until Daniel (born 1846) was 21 before they could record the deed. One hundred and four years after the first reunion, we now have the complete list of Jacob's children, at least we hope so.

The reunion chart shows Mary Oberholtzer as the d/o Jacob but neither she nor her heirs were on the deed. Mary married in 1843 Henry Bricker whose family also came from Columbiana Co OH which is around the time Jacob Oberholtzer came from there. In the 1860 census DeKalb Co, Butler Twp, Henry and Mary Bricker have 10 of their children living with them plus Samuel Oberholtzer age 23 and Daniel Oberholtzer age 14. They are no doubt her brother and half brother. Mary named 5 of her children Lydia, Sarah, Rebecca, Isaiah and Samuel, the same as 5 of the children of [JC15]

Jacob Oberholtzer. I believe Mary is the d/o Jacob but my concern is that Mary was born in 1824 and the next child of Jacob's that I can find is Lydia born 1832. Were there other children born between those 8 years who died young? Or did Jacob have an earlier marriage that we didn't know about?

STUFFED BIRDS

The 1904 inventory of John Oberholtzer (JJ24) had "A Case of Stuffed Birds \$10.00". Rene Lawrie of St Augustine FL, who worked as the Registrar in a late 19th century decorative arts museum for 23 years, said that Victorians loved having oddities under tall glass domes on round or oval wood bases which had stuffed birds or other items in them. She said that they had just been given a large one with 40 various hummingbirds. Whether used for study or as pure decoration, these items were/are definitely conversation pieces.

This same John Oberholtzer of Anselma, Chester Co PA installed a telephone about 1878 between his home and his store which were about 100 feet apart. In those days people talked of telephones but almost no person had actually seen one. It was believed they would only be a toy with no commercial value. John's wife Sarah Louisa was a poet and author and his son Ellis Paxson was an author and American Historian.

JACOB OVERHOLSER OF KINGSTON, UPPER CANADA [KC]

Jacob Overholser, his wife Barbara and their four children migrated to Canada c1810 and settled in Bertie Twp, Welland Co, Ontario. Jacob bought land, made friends with his neighbors and enjoyed a moderate degree of prosperity. The War of 1812 shattered Jacob's life. There was heavy fighting with no strong lasting military presence by either army. Some seized on this instability to settle private grudges and Overholser was a likely target. He had problems with the Anger brothers who threatened to set fire to his buildings and once stole four horses from his barn. The brothers charged that Overholser had accompanied the enemy when members of their family were taken prisoner. In April 1814 Overholser was among the men to be charged with treason. He was lumped together with avowed traitors and put on trial where 21 men were tried and 17 convicted. A petition for clemency signed by 95 residents of Bertie Township claimed that Overholser was "an honest peaceable sober and industrious inhabitant". Overholser was respited along with 8 other men and eight others were hanged. Overholser was sent to jail where he awaited confirmation of a royal pardon and transportation to Quebec and banishment but he died 3/14/1815 of typhus fever in the Kingston Military prison. At the time of his death, his farm was not fully paid for. A dispute ensued but his wife continued to reside there at least until January 1818. His 196 acres were vested in the crown and sold in 1821. There is no mention of what happened to his wife and children in this five page report after they were turned out of the house and escorted from the seized land.

ABRAHAM B OVERHOLSER [AV514]

Abraham B Overholser 9/9/1829-6/26/1884 CA, s/o Daniel Overholser and Mary Magdalena Brubaker of Carroll Co IN, left Indiana in the spring of 1864 with his wife Hester Ann and four children for California and they arrived that fall locating in Sonoma County. He was in the milling (flour) business and then he went into the meat business in Petaluma until he died. In his funeral procession, there were 110 carriages. His son Clarence Whitmore married Inez Valcencia and she is said to have died while walking down the street with two of her children when her skirt was caught on a passing vehicle and she was dragged to her death in the early 1900's. Margaret J Overholser, a granddaughter of Abraham Overholser, married Charles O Canfield who was the son of a multi millionaire oil man.

THE GRANDDAUGHTER OF HENRY OBERHOLTZER [ML2117]

Ellen Laura Oberholtzer died 1900 of typhoid fever at age 20. She was the daughter of Jacob Fox Oberholtzer and Rebecca Weller of Lebanon County PA. Two hundred and forty-one meals were served for persons attending the funeral and ninety-seven horses were fed.

A PICTURE OF ELLIE

In checking the Oberholtzer Message Board on the Internet, I found that someone had a picture of Ellie O LaBarre 1859-1890 that she wanted returned to someone in the family. The back of it said "Grandpa Harlan Oberholser's sister" and on the front were the words "Faithful unto death". I wrote to the woman who had the picture and said I knew who Ellie was. She was Ellen Oberholser who married Rev Francis B LaBarre and they had 11 children with 7 dying as infants who are buried with their parents in Pequea Baptist Cemetery, Lancaster Co PA. The picture was found by Kelly Shepard of Arkansas who goes to auctions and estate sales in the Ozarks and when she heard that I had contacted Buell Oberholser of San Luis Obispo CA who said he would be thrilled to have the picture, she said "I know Ellie is looking down on us all with gratitude that her nice picture is finally finding a perfect home. It makes me feel good". Buell is a grandson of Harlan Oberholser, son of Isaac Oberholser & Louisa Brubaker of Lancaster Co [SL2743].

THE RESULTS OF SOME DETECTIVE WORK

In among the papers that Virgie Walker of Wilmington OH sent me, was a chart of the family of Heber Overholser, s/o Cornelius [JA4264]. The information had been sent to her by Mrs Norma Houdeshell who was a daughter of Heber. I was curious to find out about what I assume was a divorce of Cornelius' first marriage so I decided to try to contact Norma who had lived in New Paris, Ohio when she sent her family data. I first checked the Social Security Death Index and I found that Norma's husband had died in Florida. I then checked the AOL White Pages and found a Norma Houdeshell living in Orlando FL and I wrote to her asking if she was Heber's daughter. She replied that she was and that back years ago divorce was never discussed so she knew nothing about her grandparent's divorce. She has sent me pictures of her great grandparents Martin Overholser and Elizabeth Wysong [JA426] which I in turn sent to Neil Kever in California and Betty Venables in Alaska who are also their great grandchildren. Neil showed the pictures to his 88 year old mother Sylvia who was really overcome with emotion to be able to see a picture of her grandmother for the first time. She was Cornelius' daughter by his second marriage which also ended in divorce and there had been no contact with the Overholser side after that. Neil was struck by the resemblance between his mother and her grandmother. Norma also sent a picture of the Overholser house in Dayton, Ohio. I am thankful that my detective work really paid off.
