

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Immigrant Father of JA, AB, and CA

Today, May 16th 2010, I spent the morning at home. After the morning rituals, I took my copy of *The Oberholtzer Book*, and a few letters from Barbara Ford's files to the back porch to read and ponder. Our porch is a covered refuge in the summer from the hustle and bustle of everyday life. After going through several pages, taking notes along the way on items which needed to be added into the computer, I came across a letter to Charlene dated July 11, 1990. Rather than explain what I read, I will quote the letter:

"I am quite confused about the date of death given in the Orphans Court records for John Overholser Sr in Adams County. It said 4/19/1794 and I see that John Sr was on the tax records from 1798 to 1810 when it said he was dead. Then there is mention that land was sold to John Sr [on April] 1803. Also in the estate papers of John Sr there is a note about John Sr and John Jr - balance due of 68 pounds to John Jr and the date is 1/18/1807. What originally bothered me was that the inventory was filed 3/15/1809. I have never run across an inventory being filed 15 years after death. The Letters of Administration appear to have the date 3/11/1809 and it also says "And further do make or cause to be made a true and just account of their said Adm. at or before the 11th day of March 1810", which would be a year after the LOA."

I was stunned! I looked at the date of the letter again. July 11th, 1990. Then I understood that Barbara was only four years away from printing her book. That means about three years till the compilation was pretty much complete. Then I realized that the pressure of putting together all those Oberholzer Lines interferred with her ability to compute, simply due to lack of time. I can really relate to that, for it happens to me regularly. Anyway, let me get to the point.

The paragraph states not two John Overholsers, but three! John Overholser Sr-Sr (as I will call him here, and list him as JAsr) died on April 19, 1794, according to the Orphan's Court records. JA John Overholser, born about 1740 and died prior to March 11, 1809, is listed also as John Sr in the letter. Both evidently lived at the same location; as did John Overholser Jr (c1767 - c8/5/1840 Darke Co OH). We know that John Overholser Jr did not have a son John, so he is the one that retains the title of Junior.

Since the Tax Records continue for John Overholser from 1798 through 1810, it reveals that both JA John and JA3 John Jr both lived at the same property also, having need of only one tax to be recorded, and thus only one John Overholser on the tax records.

Now that it is clear that JA John Overholser had a father John Overholser Sr, who is this person? I suggest the answers are already existent. In 1740, a John Overholser came from Europe and settled in Juniata PA. That is what little information was in the ship records. I have recently been in touch with the Juniata County Historical Society, which has told me they have no knowledge of him in their records. The term "Juniata" was not for a

county until the 1800's, but rather the Blue Mountain area of Central Penna.. I believe that John did not stay there long enough to be recorded. John Overholser is first found on the tax list of Reading Twp, York County (now Adams) in 1761. Since JA John Overholser would only have been about 20 years old, I suggest that John Sr-Sr was the one named on the tax list. Whether he also was a blacksmith I will show on the following page..

Reading Township lies just south of the Blue Mountain ridge, which originally was part of the Virginia territory, as was all of western Pennsylvania. Afterward for a short time Maryland territory came up to the 40th Parallel. John Sr-Sr could have very likely moved south and lived in Liberty Twp, called Maryland prior to moving up to Reading Township. Therefore, AB Abraham Overholser, and CA Christian Overholser, are very probably the sons of John Overholser Sr-Sr.

Also, JA, AB, & CA all have the same surname spelling of Overholser. Holse is an Irish corruption of the Middle English "holtz", which was used by the common folk from the 1400's to the 1800's. Also, JA & AB were both tied to the German Baptist Church.

Next Correction: CA Christian Overholser was not the father of CA1 to CA7 in *The Oberholtzer Book*, page 287. He is the grandfather! Here again the records in Barbara's files consist of two generations of the same name. Corrections are made below.

John Overholser Immigrant from Ireland

There is a premise from language arts and history that reveal the path of emmigration for John Overholser. Geneaologists in the past serveral years have shown the surname of Oberholzer & its variants to have originated all from the Oberholzer Farm east of Zurich Lake in Switzerland. From there, the younger family moved to the spring called Aa, and spread into what is now Wald. When John's ancestors were forced to flee Switzerland, they would have moved somewhere between Alsace and Belgium.

It is quite likely that some of the Oberholzer descendants, which have not been documented, were part of the earliest group who travelled in 1707-1709 to England, hoping to find passage to America. It is now understood that the poorest of the group of immigrants in England were sent to Ireland. There they stayed for several years, due to lack of funds for travel to America.

When John's grandson passed away, his wife signed the death certificate. On it she wrote what she had heard and remembered from the few and evidently far between family talks. She wrote her husband's mother's name, which was correct. But when she wrote his father's name, she wrote that he was born in Ireland. This was not a lie, just a mistake in the generations.

There is another clue as to from where JA John immigrated. His daughter has a proper name of Sarah. This is the German name. But in some documents she is referred to as "Sallie". This is an Irish name. How appropriate for a family who through poverty was forced to live in a country not their own for several years, until the chlildren could scrape up enough funds to find their way to America.

JAsr John Overholser Sr b Ireland - 1740 Immigrant from Ireland to Juniata PA - d 4/19/1794

Probably moved to Maryland near Tanneytown in 1750's, and/or Liberty Twp, Adams County

Moved to Reading Twp, Adams Co PA, taxed in 1761

Children of Immigrant John Sr: JA John Overholser; AB Abraham Overholser; CA Christian Overholser; and grandfather of JM John Overholser

"John Overholster, one of 150 teamsters (wagon haulers) recruited at Lancaster by Benjamin Franklin to be a wagoner for General Braddock on 4/30/1755 in the campaign against Fort DuQuesne. John of Adams Co was the only John I can find in that area at that time."

First found on the 1761 tax list Reading Twp, York Co (now Adams). He was a blacksmith and probably an immigrant. JA was only about 20 years old, so these references are likely about JAsr.

JA3 John Overholser Jr c1767 - c8/5/1840 Darke Co OH m **Margaret [?].** We believe that this is the John Overholser who dies in Darke Co OH 1840. Henry Overholser, Administrator of the estate, posted the bond 9/7/1840 with Benjamin Overholser & David Lime as surities. Henry made 2 trips to Strawtown IN to settle the estate-that is the are where Cornelius Overholser (JA33) lived. Cornelius came from IN to the vendue sale of John Overholser's estate 10/3/1840. JA John of Adams Co PA was a blacksmith, as was John of Darke Co. In the estate papers of John's father, John Jr's signature appears and it is very much like the one in the estate papers of John of Darke Co, although there were about 30 years between the signatures. John Jr disappears from the Adams Co tax list in 1829 which may mean that he left for Ohio then. The Census is what we feel is part of John's family (the 1820 census shows 4 sons & 3 daughters in Adams Co PA).

OUR BARBARIAN ROOTS

The Years of the Hapsburg Dynasty

On October 1, 1273, "news was brought to Rudolf that had been elected King of Germany. Notwithstanding the extension of his power eastward, he likewise continued his aggressive policy in Switzerland. ... And, taking advantage of the pecuniary straits of the monastery of Nurbach, he obtained by one means or another Lucerne, which belonged to the abbey, as well as numerous farms reaching into the Forest Cantons. The stewardship of Einsiedeln and Pfaffers likewise fell to his share. Many more instances might be given to show how Rudolf's clever and unscrupulous scheming extended his power all over the midlands and the eastern districts, and how grievously his hand was felt throughout the country. Yet the famous Habsburgs, able, warlike, and energetic as they were, met with one obstacle to their progress which they were unable to remove, and against which all their plans came to nought - the love of freedom innate in the Swiss peoples."

"Genuine democracies represent the cantons [of today] a Landsgemeinde. The government embodied the will of a sovereign people, and from its very antiquity commands our veneration and deserves special attention. To time immemorial the ancient custom goes back. It was known amongst the Greeks, and meet with it in the 'Volksversammlung' of the early German tribes - the gathering of a whole people around their king to administer justice or decide issues of peace or war. These assemblies sprang up again in the thirteenth century, in the Forest Cantons, but now became political meetings, from the necessity of guarding against a common foe. The rule by Landsgemeinde was adopted by eleven Alpine districts, of which two, Gersau and Urseren, were almost microscopical. Five of these were swept away, Schwyz amongst the number. Of these we shall not speak. Yet the hoary and patriarchal custom still lingers on in some of the secluded Alpine nooks, favored by the isolation of the place, and the genie conservateur innate in the Alpine folk. Unable, however, to clearly understand the ancient Landsgemeinde except by reference to the present age, we prefer to draw the reader's attention to the living spring, the sacred spot where he can 'look face to face on freedom in its purest and most ancient form' -to quote Freeman's fine words - a heart-stirring sight to witness."

"The last Sunday in April is the date usually fixed for the holding of the Landsgemeinde. The gatherings all bear a general resemblance to each other, yet each shows the influence of the locality, the religion, or the industrial pursuits of the people."

"It is clearly absurd to suppose that the three Forest Cantons sprang suddenly into existence as democracies. Feudalism had spread its net over the Waldstattenas elsewhere in Switzerland and Europe generally. But the inborn love of freedom amongst the 'freemen' of the three cantons was intensified by two things, the secluded Alpine life and the tyranny and aggressiveness of the Habsburgs."

"The death of Rudolf in 1291 was good news to the men of the Forest, and all their pent-up hopes of the recovery of their ancient rights once more burst forth. Yet dreading new dangers from new governors, they took measures of precaution. Within a fortnight of Rudolf's death the three districts of Uri, Schwyz, and Unterwalden had entered into a perpetual league of defensive alliance (Ewiger Bund), a renewal no doubt of a previous pact, probably that of 1246. They may have met on the Rutli to swear the solemn oath which was to bind them into a confederation, a perpetuite .

The various acts of agreement were drawn up in Latin, and the document - the Magna Charta of the Eidgenossenschaft - treasured up at Schwyz, is held in veneration by the whole Swiss nation. It bears an essentially conservative character, and witnesses to the thought and consideration given to the matter, no less than to the strong sense of equity and clear judgment of the contracting parties. Amongst other things it enjoins that every one shall obey and serve his master according to his standing; that no judge shall be appointed who has bought his office with gold, nor unless he be a native; that if quarrels shall arise between the Eidgenossen (inter aliquos conspiratos), the more sensible shall settle the differences, and if the one party does not submit, the opposition shall decide in the matter. To the document were affixed the seals of the three countries as a guarantee of its authenticity."

The forest cantons viewed life no different than others in Europe. The Habsburgs' Rudolf died at Germesheim on July 15, 1291. His successor Albert was deemed "uncouth and vulgar in appearance, ferocious and unseemly in aspect, gloomy and reserved by habit and constitution, even his good qualities were obscured."* To someone who has been following the ancient barbarian Alemani tribe through its' history, this description would seem disgustingly similar to their Oberholzer ancestors. But it is obvious from the many humiliating defeats of the barbaric tribes, that these families who moved into the upper Alps were wanting both personal freedom and peace from all the warfare; as well as an increase in their living standards. Thus it was understandable why the forest cantons rebelled and seized Habsburg possessions in the early 14th Century.

The Oberholzer *hof* or farm became a unique part of history. It sat high on the Swiss landscape, off the beaten path of commerce and waring power entities. This allowed growth of the family with less loss of life. It allowed for peaceful co-existence with the neighbors. But the downside to this was a greedy Zurich authority which wanted to cash in on the wealth of the family. Due to this enigma, the Oberholzer farm became part of a long political battle for freedom. Being on the border of the Canton of St Gallen, the farm annexed itself to St. Gallen whenever it became of benefit to the forest inhabitants.
