Did Rev William go to Canada?

In a letter written November 3, 1985, John L Overholt of Virginia wrote to Barbara Ford concerning a Reverand William Oberholtzer. It goes like this:

Medina Mennonite Cemetary Record:

Henry Geisinger died Apr 28, 1872 at age 86 yr 1 mo,

son of Jacob Geisinger and Barbara Kulp (d/o Michael Kulp [Sr])

Michael Kulp [Jr] born 3/15/1786 Northampton Co PA m Elizabeth Kurtz

Local accounts consider the Henry Kurtz family the first Mennonites to arrive in Medina Co OH. They migrated from the vicinity of Toronto Ontario.

Henry is said to have gone personally back to Northampton Co to bring back William Oberholtzer (who we believe was his uncle) to help start the new church. From various sources we laboriously put together about Henry's children which was later verified and supplemented and the order corrected by a descendant John A Fields of Morrison CO.

Rev William Oberholtzer's daughter Lydia Overholt had 9 children and reside in Missouri.

Rev William's grandfather MT Mark Overholt did not go to Canada. But he died in Tinicum, Bucks Co, which was the same township "Tory" John Overholt lived in, who died on Statten Island NY. We now know that Mark was born in Brooklin NY. Is it possible that JT John, IC Isaac, and MT Mark were closely related? Many of their children went to Canada. Did William? Probably not. Being a grandson, he likely went straight out to Medina Co OH from Bucks Co. But he did know many relatives in Canada.

OUR BARBARIAN ROOTS

Culture & Dialect surrounding Oberholtz at the end of the 1st Millennium CE

"A few words may be given here respecting the famous monastery of St. Gall. The cloisters of St Gall shed a bright luster on Swabian lands during its best period, from 800 to 1050 A.D. This famous religious-house was a centre of art and high culture, and was a blessing to the whole country. We can but allude to some of its famous monks, such as the Notkers, Ekkehard, Ratbert, and so forth; many famous as poets, musicians, savants, historians, and teachers of the very highest rank. In the noted school attached to the monastery there resided and were educated some three hundred sons of the German and Helvetic nobility. The discipline kept up was most severe. A story runs that King Conrad I [from the Stauffer family which some of us belong] on a visit to the institution, wished to put this to the test, and caused to be scattered under the school benches a basket full of fine apples. Not a single scholar touched the fruit, and, to reward them for this very remarkable self-restraint, Conrad gave the youths three holidays. But the number of anecdotes attaching to this magnificent institution is endless."

For those of us who have a high percentage of Swiss blood, it is most interesting to note the beginnings of change from the Dark Ages to the Medieval Age. Charlemagne was not the total tyrant today's media makes him appear. Much more on this will come, as this editor is tracing his kingly ancestral beginnings across the European landscape.

The Alemanni people who populated the mountain tops of Eastern Switzerland speak a High German Dialect. "The Gallo-Romans and the Italians spoke with slight differences a similar language, derived from the Latin. But the Germans retained their Teutonic idiom. Charlemagne left to the Lombards and Saxons their own laws. The Salian and Riparian Franks, the Alemani and Bavarians, preserved theirs. Thus these peoples were not fused and welded in one. The will of Charlemagne was the only bond that held them together."

"The greatest changes were effected by the growth of feudalism, which had arisen indeed under Charlemagne, but had to some extent been checked by him. Feudalism outgrew all other systems, and entirely disarranged the social scale. The free peasantry shrank to a small number, and there sprang up a martial nobility of high functionaries, who held offices in the army or courts of justice, and exerted much influence. On the native soil, on the very meeting-places where the old German people had assembled to deal with civil and judicial matters, eminent men founded families which grew into reigning houses. These men, combining political discernment with military ability and experience, rose above their

fellows, and assumed the highest offices. The distresses, the dissensions, the intestine wars, and particularly the invasion by savage hordes drove people to seek the protection of powerful lords even at the risk of losing their own independence. In most cases the people became 'unfree', or serfs."

What about the Almosts?

What does one do when they find a person who almost fits their info, but not exactly? One may not assume it is the same person. That is how the internet has become so unreliable.

Having an Association is a big help, in that they may be able to weed out the misinformation. For instance, their was a question concerning an Abraham Martin who married a Barbara Oberholtzer. Abraham was listed as living 1748 to 1850. While some do live that long, it is usually a sign to suspect a mistake. It turns out that Abraham lived only until 1815, and is JL7 in the Jacob of Brecknock line.

Minor variations may be due to the differences in the calendar used. During early immigrations in the 18th Century, England was still using the Julian Calendar, while most, but not all, of mainland Europe had changed to the Gregorian Calendar. From ten days to 13 months difference in dates could still be the same person.

Older information is often a problem, in that death dates are often given from legal documents, such as inventory, or Orphan's Court records. The person may have died as much as a couple years earlier.

Birth dates could actually be a church christening date, as much as years after the birth of a child. Children by another mother may not even be recorded.

Do not discard some info just because it does not match perfectly. But also do not assume it to be the same person. More investigation is needed. By learning the little variations in why dates are not identical can lead to a better understanding of how people thought in the past, and may help to locate a lost connection to a family who wishes to tell their story.

Child Disposal Onboard

During 17 years of searching my family tree, the most shocking revelation came as I was nearing completion of my search. The Mann family was residing in Germany when the father died. The mother and one year old son picked up and left on a hopeful voyage to America to start anew. But the three month journey was too much for the mother, and she died enroute.

The rule of seafaring is a tough one to swallow. For thousands of years, it was law to throw the desceased overboard, so as to not cause any disease to spread. If the person had any children under the age of fourteen, a request was made for anyone on the boat to take on the child, or children of the desceased as guardian. The rule of the sea untill almost the 19th century was that if no one on the ship would take the child or children on as guardian, the child would be thrown overboard alive with the desceased, putting it into the "hands of God".

Fortunately for me, the Stehman family raised the Mann child, and I am here as living proof.

With thought in mind, Lena Overholt Miller and Harris D Overholt compiled a volume of history and descendants of the John Overholt and Veronica Stuckey family to debut at the reunion. Each grandchild is featured in a chapter of memories; their known descendants, dates, marriages, and etc concludes each chapter. Because of the scope of the Overholt family, chapters are included with known descendants of John and Anna Drissel Overholt with dates, marriages, etc but not the memories.

Veronica Stuckey arrived from France with her father and her two daughters Caroline and Catherine Stuckey (newsletter incorrectly lists as Overholt, page 8) and a chapter is included for each with their known descendants. .. The first chapter is history of the Overholt family in Europe and also includes pictures of the Overholt area in Pennsylvania as well as the Overholt family tour reunion to Oberholz Switzerland in September 2002.

As the volume grew, we became keenly aware that it was more than we had perceived but profit was not a factor in publishing. The hard-bound, over 700 page *John and Veronica Overholt - Mine, Yours, & Ours* volume is available from the above address for \$50.00 pick up or \$60.00 U S Postal Service. We have a limited supply but are able to have reprints for future needs. Just this week another forty pages has been documented of a Drissel descendant line that was not known during the compiling of the volume, so while it is not a complete family history, we are grateful for the amount of information that is published.


