Oberholzer's Covered Bridges - Which which is which?

Oberhaltzer's Covered Bridge

There are two covered bridges in north eastern Lancaster County PA. The only difference in the name is one vowel. At the Red Run Campground stands the Oberhaltzer's Covered Bridge. It once crossed the Muddy Creek, now alongside the campground. The property has a long history of ownership:

- 1772 Souber to Samuel Martin Book A Vol5, Pg 251
- 1822 Samuel Martin to Henry Frankhouser original mill built 1824
- 1847 Rachel and John Lupold to Joseph W Oberholtzer
- 1851 Abraham Eberly to Joseph W Overholser, miller
- 1854 Isaac Martin additional land to Joseph W Oberholtzer

Notice the spelling change. The bridges name at some unknown time became Oberhaltzer's Bridge. This is the only known spelling with an "a".

1858 John Lupold to Joseph Oberholtzer This sale included a house, grist mill, and sawmill. Joseph is JL374 Joseph W Oberholtzer and wife Magdalena Wanner

1866 The Covered Bridge was built in 1866 having a length of 104 feet, and 15 feet wide. It has a Burr type truss system. The builder was Elias McMellen. It has vertical plank siding. He owned the mill on Muddy Creek, bought from his Uncle Daniel & Maria Eby Wanner

- 1870 Joseph Oberholtzer to Joseph Wenger
- 1875 Joseph Wenger to Samuel Sensenig
- 1896 Joseph Wenger to R Davis Oberholtzer of Bowmansville, Brecknock Twp.
- 1898 Richard Oberholtzer and wife Lizzie of Bowmansville PA to Menno Eberly

Today, this covered bridge is in poor condition, and cannot be driven on. It sits on Red Run Campground, 877 Martin Church Road, New Holland PA, west of Route 816 in Earl Township, Lancaster County.

Oberholtzer's Covered Bridge north of the Cats Back









On the north side of the Cat's Back east of Farmersville PA was the home of two brothers of SL2467 Christian H Oberholtzer 5/11/1837 - 1/17/1900. On the corner south of the covered bridge was SL24672 Christian Oberholtzer. Christian later sold out and moved to Landis Valley. This bridge is also built with vertical siding. As we walk over the covered bridge, we go north to the T intersection about 1/8th mile away. Across the intersection is a large home, once owned by SL24671 Jacob Oberholtzer, brother of Christian.

This bridge has been hit at the roof by two trucks, too tall to enter. It is presently being repaired from the last accident.

During the Reunion this Year, Dennis L Oberholtzer will be at the International Shroud Conference and Symposium in St Louis MO.

This is a sensitive subject around the world, and needs as much help and guidance as possible.

Corrections and Additions OW Henry Owerwasser

Upon my recent appointment as your new Secretary, I asked Dennis what can I learn to assist me in my role. He suggested I read the OFA Bulletins. So I began my journey of reading the aforementioned bulletins. To my surprise I was delighted to discover a number of stories on my own ancestral families such as the Kreys and the op den Graeffs. \

Then I came upon the genealogy of Henry Owerwasser on page 7 of the Winter 2012 Edition. Henry happens to be my 6th great grandfather. The article delineates his descendants from Henry's daughter marrying John Brubaker, by which they have three sons and one daughter. My fourth great grandfather, Abraham, was their second son.

Abraham, quite a gifted individual, becomes a farmer, school master and a prolific fractur artist: to the degree that Mennonite Life is in possession of 4 of his works and I discovered at least 9 more of his pieces on the internet.

Abraham and second wife, Anna Kreider, gave life to seven children, 5 sons and two daughters. Their seventh child is Henry Brubaker, my third great grandfather. As cited on page 9, Henry marries Hannah Kurtz. This is where to my amazement, I find second great grandfather, Abraham Kurtz Brubaker, missing. Then I remembered I had the same problem when trying to research his parents, coming from the opposite direction.

What helped me to connect Abraham Kurtz Brubaker to his parents was

finding his obituary in the Lancaster Newspapers of Monday, March 16, 1903. In this obituary, towards the end, cites his four surviving sisters. Three of these sisters were married and one listed as Miss Fannie of Salunga, PA. upon further cross-referencing, I found they all shared the same parents, Henry and Hannah Brubaker. It should be noted they were also listed as daughters of Henry and Hannah in the aforementioned descendants of Henry Owerwasser and in the Brubakers of America book in possession of Mennonite life; hence, I found Abraham Brubaker's parents.

Ir raised a question. Why was he absent in these genealogies. Upon further examination, Abraham was initially married to Leah Shank, who unfortunately died at the age of 29. Leah had her first child, Ann Brubaker at the age of 17, which means she was pregnant while she was 16. Could it have been that Abraham Kurtz Brubaker was the recipient of a "shunning" that caused a falling away with his parents? This I do know, Abraham left the Mennonite Church and became a member of the Methodist Church and he also left farming, as was his father's occupation and Abraham pursued a career as a shoemaker.

The following family line on page 10 is the corrections and additions for the Henry Owerwasser genealogy.

It should be noted that it is not unusual to have several different surname spellings for one person, or family. It is rarely found, however, six different spellings for one person. The multiple reasons for this is explained in the previous articles of the OFA Bulletins. - DLO

Rev I E Oberholtzer hand-written thoughts in his Comp Book

ca1930's, typed by Dennis L Oberholtzer, February 2025 *italics by Dennis L Oberholtzer*

Reverend Isaiah E Oberholtzer is from the SL22 Line of Oberholtzers in Lancaster Co PA. He was a missionary to China from the 1920's to about 1942 during World War II. He was the first major genealogist for the Oberholzers in America. He wrote many letters from China to American O's on rice paper; and while in America on many types of paper and filled several composition notebooks. The following is from his Comp Book #6. He does not indicate where all his material originated. In another notebook Isaiah does mention the Fretz genealogy is in the Yale University Library.

It is a matter of interest to know who our ancestors were on American soil and their history. And it is even of greater interest to know who our progenitors were in the Old World, and something of their lives. We are also curious to know from what nationality we spring, whether we originate with the Spaniards, the Greeks, Romans, Gauls, Germans, or Swiss. The solution of this latter problem rests with the establishing of the Journal of the family, which may be not so difficult.

It is recorded in the *Book of Heraldry* journal in the public Library of Vienna, that the family of Bretz (Fretz), as formerly written, had its origin in Trier, on the horn [of the] Rhine, where Fabius Bretius, a Roman General of Calvary, located about 224 A. D. having been a native of Capua in Southern Italy. He married Olfa, daughter of a German Duke, and died 263 A.D. On his line of descent was Daniel Bretz, who died 1681, leaving two sons, Felix and Christof, one of whom is in ancestor of John Philip Bretz, who was born in Windersheim, near Crentmacht on the Rhine in 1755, and who immigrated to America and settled in Lancaster Co PA where he died and is buried. Members of this family now spell the name Pretz.

While it is now probable that we descend from the line of the above Daniel Bretz, it may yet be possible if we could get to the facts. The discrepancy in the spelling of the name Bretz, Pretz, or Fretz has little point in the question. Members of the Moore $\{?\}$ family at different times in various locations change the spelling.

The fact that Fabius Bretius located not far from the place of the vicinity of our ancestors gives coloring to the idea that the latter were descendants of the former. Manheim near which tradition says our ancestors were located, is about one hundred miles east from Trier, on the Upper Rhine [River], in the vicinity of which Fretz's are still to be found, and about one hundred and thirty miles south from Trier, at Gebweiler and Muehlhausen, are also located many Fretz. If this the foundation of the family in the fatherland is established, it is then evident that the family originated with the Romans, the nation of the Caesars, and assisted in the founding of that once mighty empire.

According to tradition of the Fretz family, the ancestors John and Christian Fretz, with a third brother who died on the voyage, came from near the city of Manheim, Providence of Baden Germany. Formerly known as the Palatinate, of Rhenish Prussia, and therefore were of German nationality. Although during the persecutions of the Mennonites from the Palatinate were among its early settlers of Bucks, Montgomery, and Chester Counties among them, if tradition of the family can be relied on, were the Moyer ancestors.

The Fretz brothers came over single men, married their wives in American soil, and here were all their children born.

It was formerly thought that John Fretz of Lancaster Co PA, Barbara Fretz Longenecker, Jacob Fretz, and Henry Fretz were also sons of Christian Fretz Sr. of Tinicum Twp. But his will made in writing January 22, 1777 and proved April 26, 1784, and on record at Doylestown PA shows that they were Not his children. We must therefore look for their ancestors elsewhere.

Reverend Christian was married into the Fretz family, and that is why he was so interested in their genealogy.

Taming the Wild West - the Rest of the Story

In the Winter issue it was mentioned one of the members of the posse chasing Jesse James gang of outlaws was a Dr Overholt. Thanks to Dan Draeger, who sent in an article from *Physician Tribute* about Dr Henry Overholt, we have the rest of the story.

Dr George Henry Overholt was born near Beamsville Ontario on March 7, 1842. He was the 3rd of 7 children to MT243 Mark Overholt and the former Catherine Gilmore. His parents farmed in Lincoln County near Beamsville. .. He had brothers Alfred & Nathan, Almeda Overholt, William Franklin, Peter, and Elizabeth Jane. Dr Overholt's father died in Romney Twp near Wheatley May 11, 1888, while living with William Franklin.

Dr Overholt married the first time May 6, 1865 to Charlotte Harriet Warren in Wentworth Co Ontario. Her parents, William Henry Warren and Harriett Greenslade in Montreal. William was a church organist at Christ Church Cathedral in 1842.

Henry Graduated as an MD from Albany Medical College in 1866. They had a five year old son George Alison Overholt who died Sept 10, 1869. Another son, Richard Thomas Overholt was born in 1869 at Wheatley. In 1870 the family migrated to Madelia Minnesota. There they had a daughter Laura Grace Overholt in 1873 and Stella Overholt came in 1874. G H Overholt was born June 4th 1875. Charlie Overholt came on July 19, 1876 and Nellie on December 22, 1879.

After the Jesse James episode on September 7, 1876, Dr Overholt remained as Superintendent of Schools for Madelia until 1877. By 1885 the family moved to Kenyon, Goodhue Co MN. Son Richard was living separately with wife Jennie and son Archibald. Born in Ontario, Richard died in 1903 and buried at Kenyon Cemetary.

Mrs Overholt died April 9, 1906. Son Charlie died Sept 4, 1918. Both buried at Kenyon. Dr Henry married a second time to Betsey Groven in 1907. She was from Norway. Her son Clarence was adopted by Dr Henry.

MT2433 Dr Overholt died at home February 23, 1928 in Kenyon MN. Betsey passed away on April 18, 1934. Her son Clarence served in WWI and WWII.
