ROSY OBERHOLZER WAS GUEST
OF HONOR AT REUNION

Those who attended the Reunion last August had the pleasure of meeting one of our most distant members and one who lives in what is traditionally considered the place from which our forebears, the Overholzers, came. She was ROSY OBERHOLZER from Oberholz, Switzerland. She came especially to attend the Reunion, her first although she has visited several members of the Association twice before in the recent past.

A charming woman, Rosy is the wife of GOTTFRIED OBERHOLZER and the mother of three sons and three daughters. She and her husband operate the Gasthaus Kantonsgrenze, or Guest House on the Canton Border (that is, on the border of two cantons or states), in the tiny town of Oberholz (population 13 families) 25 miles east of Zurich near the town of Wald. They run a ski lift to the top of a nearby mountain and during ski season, serve as many as 1000 people a day at their restaurant.

Rosy has done some research into the Oberholzer background but has not made a connection between her husband's family and Immigrant Samuel who, tradition has it, came from that region before emigrating to the Palatinate and then to America.

Since Rosy does not speak English, RUTH OVERHOLSER was her interpreter at the Reunion and read the statement of greetings Rosy had written and which appears in this issue. Her children, who speak fluent English, translate THE BULLETIN for her.

She visited with SPENCER and RUTH OVERHOLSER at their home in Oley, Berks County, before returning to Switzerland. The Overholzers have visited Rosy in Oberholz five times, as well as other members of the Association, including HARRY and GLORIA OVERHOLTZER and MILDRED PETTIGREW, all of Pottstown.

Rosy gave each one at the Reunion several postcards depicting her restaurant and the town of Oberholz and the surrounding countryside. The town is situated in a beautiful valley surrounded by mountains.

It was a real pleasure having Rosy as our guest of honor and we hope she returns many times in the years ahead.

ROSY OBERHOLZER'S GREETINGS

Translated and read by Ruth Overholser

The name Overholser comes from Oberholz. History tells us it goes back more than a thousand years. In those times the area was all wooded and families lived from the land. As families grew, they cleared more and more land to till.

About 1300, several families colonized or settled together in a single area. This was a half day's journey by foot from the town of Wald. These people lived near the area of the wooded place and so were called the "Bauern im Hof in obern Holz", which means "the farmers in the village above the woods." Later they were given the name of Oberholz or Oberholzer.

1523 - The Reformation. The villagers, who had all been Catholic, visited the church in Wald which had become Protestant through Zwingli. In the end the Catholics went to the church at Eschenbach and remained Catholic. The other group stayed in Wald and became Protestants.

A story tells about two brothers who decided each would attend the church whose bells he heard the loudest. So the one "above" the woods heard the bells from Eschenbach and became Catholic and the other living "below" the woods heard the bells in Wald and became Protestant.

With time, more families came to Oberholz. It is written that the Oberholzers were hard-working, ambitious people. Later the Oberholzer lands were divided amongst the families and each had a small amount. To this day there is a Catholic Oberholzer corporation dating from those long ago times. Now only two Oberholzer families are left to belong whereas 20 families belonged at one time.

Gradually the young people went elsewhere to make their way, until now they are everywhere in Switzerland. It is known that a certain Oberholzer went to Holland generations ago. Later some also came to the United States, among them Samuel, but from which family of Oberholzers he came I do not know. If I have time, I would like to look for more information but we do know that the Oberholzers went out into the whole world.

Dear Oberholzer friends: It makes me very happy to bring you greetings from Oberholz and to get acquainted with you. I hope that the Oberholzer Freundschaft will re-

NEED HELP?

Most members of the Association are primarily interested in their own genealogical line. One of the best services we can provide our members is putting you in touch with others who are compiling information on the same line so that a mutually-beneficial exchange can take place. The only hindrance to this is that we don't know what line our members are interested in or belong to.

In analyzing our membership list, we find that we lack this information for the great majority (two-thirds) of our members. Of the 150 members we already have it for, 127 (or 85%) of them are in the same line, III Martin-IV Christian. This is mainly due to the prodigious effort of Robert M. Oberholser of Freehold, N.J. in compiling "a record of the ancestors and descendants of Christian Oberholser (1798-1884) and Susanna Kurtz (1805-1860)" and publishing it in 1980 in an 86-page booklet, THE SALISBURY TOWNSHIP OBERHOLSERS. In conducting this monumental and painstaking research, Robert persuaded many of Christian and Susann's descendants to join the Association, with the result that they form one-third of our membership, a tribute to one man's perseverance.

We would like to know what line or lines YOU are particularly interested in so that we can record this information to facilitate the exchange of data among members. We would like to hear from you. Just drop us a line (a postcard will do) telling what line you are in and if you are interested in the names and addresses of others in the same line. You needn't go into detail with charts and tables (although we would be glad to receive these too for our files), just the basic information will do.

OVERHOLTS IN CANADA -- New member EUGENE SINGER is researching the OVERHOLTS who fled to Canada after the Revolutionary War. In pondering why they went, he writes: "It was a brutalizing experience to get there, and hard work to clear the land and set up for living. Add to that the drought and famine of 1787 and it is a gruesome picture. The mass settlement of Upper Canada (now Ontario) was made by displaced Loyalists, or Tories. One question I have is, why the Mennonite OVERHOLTS? The only answer I can come up with is that the German community was generally loyal to the Crown because it was England which offered a way out of the persecution of Europe. So, while they might have been non-participants, their attitudes could have shown through strongly enough in some cases to cause troubles with the rebelling Colonials. Feelings ran high and it didn't take much to cause the hotheads to burn barns and run off stock, or worse. That's my theory at least, but I wonder if any Association member has concrete documentation on why the several Mennonite families took on the task of conquering the wilderness." CHRISTIAN HAINES OBERHOLSER
Third President of the Overholser
Family Association

Editor Jim has assigned me to write a short biographical sketch of the third President of the Overholser Family Association who, by a strange coincidence, happens to be my father, Christian Haines Oberholser. And I bring to this assignment the perspective of a 92-year-old son, whose early adoration of his father has been enhanced by the passage of time.

VI Christian Oberholser was born in 1858, the son of V Martin Oberholser and Anna Mary Frances Haines, the Quakeress daughter of Reuben Haines and Jane Sonders. Leaving school at an early age to assume the management of his father's Lancaster County farm, he was without much formal education, the disadvantage of which he overcame in later life by entering into the civic and political affairs of the communities in which he lived.

In 1888 he married Margaret Baldwin, the youngest daughter of Robert Baldwin, owner of a local general store at Cains, Pa. (Lancaster County), a State Senator and a close neighbor of the Oberholser family. Three children resulted from this marriage -- Edith, unmarried and long a high school teacher in the Philadelphia school system; Edward, an executive of the Manhattan Shirt Co.; and Robert, married and the father of three children and for 37 years the Superintendent of Schools of Bordentown City, N.J.

Upon the death of Christian's mother in 1893, the family farm in Salisbury Township was sold and Christian with his young family, moved to West Caln Township, Chester County, Pa. where he operated a rented farm for seven years. In 1900 he moved to a farm in Lionville, Uwchlan Township, Chester County, which he and

Margaret had bought from Holland Beitler.

Both Christian and Margaret died in 1940 within a few weeks of each other and both are buried in the family plot in St. Paul's Lutheran Church cemetery, Lionville, Pa.

Christian's interest in community affairs is evidenced by the fact that he served as a member of the Board of Education during his short stay in West Caln Township. In Uwchlan Township he was also a member of the Board of Education and served as President for many years during which period he was responsible for the organization of a two-year high school. He also served as Township Supervisor, Master of Uwchlan Grange, Noble Grand of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, President of the Council of St. Paul's Lutheran Church and for years superintendent of its Sunday School.

My most vivid remembrance of my father was his continued interest in competition, in games of all kinds. He continued his participation in checkers and quoits as long as he lived and played baseball on the local ball team long past his 60th birthday. A man always known to speak his opinion on important topics, he was always tolerant of the opinions of others.

Christian's interest in the Overholser Family Association has carried over to his descendants. Edward was serving as Vice-President when he died in 1968. Edith long served as Corresponding Secretary and at her death that position was filled by Christian's granddaughter, Elizabeth O. Frey, while the writer served several years as Treasurer and is presently Necrologist.
