TRAMPING THE ORIGINAL OBERHOLTZER LAND

Last summer at the invitation of Association member Harold M. Kilheffer, President Spencer Overholser and Editor Jim Kehew and their wives visited the 207-acre plot of land in Lancaster County, Pa. that immigrant Samuel Oberholtzer bought in 1746, two years before his death. Guided by Harold and his wife, we drove on back roads, down country lanes, and saw a few remnants of what existed in Samuel's and his childrens' time -- a mill and mill dam and some old houses built by their neighbors. As Harold said, "The Oberholtzers would not recognize the old homestead today, it is now a housing development, as is the nearby unpatented tract where Samuel first settled about 1738."

He writes, "As I write this letter, I can look out the window and see the tract of land where the Oberholtzer family had its beginning here in Manor Township, Lancaster County, near Millersville. My immigrant ancestor, Henry Kilheffer, was a neighbor of Samuel's and a witness to his will in 1748. Jacob Kilheffer, a son of Henry, married Maria Oberholtzer, a daughter of Samuel's son (II) Martin. Jacob and Maria were my great-great-grandparents. They purchased the Oberholtzer homestead in 1782 from Maria's brothers and sisters and it stayed in the Kilheffer family for three generations."

Harold has done and continues to do extensive research into his family history, including the changes in ownership of the Oberholtzer land from the purchase in 1746 down to 1852, by which time the tract had "shrunk" from 207 acres to 100 acres and 25 perches. This was done from the original deeds in the Lancaster Court House. We appreciate his kindness in arranging this expedition.

HAIL THE NONAGENARIANS!

Within our membership, we have four individuals in their nineties (that we know of; if there are more, the Editor would appreciate hearing about them). Such longevity in itself is worthy of recognition but it turns out that these nonagenarians have not only led full and meaningful lives but are still tremendously active. For these reasons, we want to pay tribute to them by sharing their stories with you in THE BULLETIN.

They are (in order of longevity) REV. JOSEPH E. OVERHOLSER (99 years old), BERNICE OBER-HOLSER LAYTON and ROBERT M. OBERHOLSER (both 93), and ESTA BUCH HERR (92). Bernice and Robert trace their ancestry through the III Martin IV Christian line, Esta is a descendant of III Martin IV Daniel, and Rev. Overholser's forebears go back to a Jacob Overholser who emigrated from Pennsylvania to near Dayton, Ohio in the early pioneer days.

Our oldest member, REV. OVERHOLSER, lives in Bradford, Ohio. He and his first wife, Esther Frey, had 5 children, two still living. After her death, he married Ida Yaney, mother of 9 children. Large families were commonplace for the Overholsers -- when Joseph's mother remarried, there were 14 lively children in the household!

Extremely active for his age, he is a notary public and has been doing income tax reports (about 100 a year) for farmers and small firms for 45 years. He was ordained in 1918 and did supply services but never held a pastorate. Most of his ministerial work is weddings, over 250 to date (including several of his great-grandchildren), most done in his home.

In his lengthy career, he has worked for the Brethren Publishing House, Pennsylvania Railroad, done sales work, and operated an insurance agency. He is in good health, drives a car (his license is good for two more years), sometimes driving 160 miles to visit his wife Ida in a nursing home in Indiana. (She celebrated her 100th birthday in January!) Many have asked his secret of longevity - he is in the process of divulging it in book form, saying he has enough work to keep him busy for the next 5 years!

BERNICE LAYTON of Bull Shoals, Ark., born in Kansas, started teaching in a country school with 20 students. Two teaching jobs later, she met her first husband, Olaf Olson, a Methodist minister, and began a 39-year marriage. He served small rural churches in Nebraska, Illinois and Iowa. Upon retirement, they visited Florida and California seeking a compatible retirement situation but neither appealed to them. A Methodist layman from Oklahoma was gathering Methodists to some property he owned in the Ozarks and offered lots to Methodist ministers at half price. So they settled near Bull Shoals Lake, largest in the Ozarks, for three years until Olaf's death in 1956.

Bernice's second husband, C. A. Holmgren, was also a Methodist minister. Their short-lived marriage ended with his death in 1962. Several years later, Bernice went to the door and there stood Frank Layton, a widower she had dated 50 years earlier but who had married a fellow teacher of hers. They next met several months later at a family reunion in Kansas and within three weeks were married. After 12 years of marriage, Frank passed away in 1981.

Bernice lives with a companion in the home she and Olaf built in Bull Shoals. She gets around fairly well with a walker, spends much time reading books and has her favorite TV programs. Her niece, Eleanor Bray, lives nearby. Bernice still supports the Heifer Project, one of her favorite charities over the years, which sends beef animals to less-developed countries.

Our other 93-year-old member, ROBERT OBER-HOLSER, is one of the most active members of the Association - never misses a Reunion and has served as Treasurer, Editor and Necrologist (presently). He is the kind of person every family should have. In 1980 after years of compilation, he published an 85-page booklet, THE SALISBURY TOWNSHIP OBERHOLSERS (of Lancaster County, Pa.), tracing 10 generations descended from IV Christian and Susanna Kurtz Oberholser, a truly complete and monumental work. He did the same for one great-grandfather's line and is now engaged in compiling data of another's descendants. A widower, he lives with his daughter and her family in Freehold, N.J. where he is an avid gardener and enjoys good health.

Robert was a lifelong educator. After graduation from Franklin and Marshall College, he was a teacher and principal in Pennsylvania and New Jersey high schools for 6 years until the onset of World War I. 1918 was a big year for him: he married Grace Johnson, beginning a marriage of 57 years blessed with three children, and was inducted into the Army, serving in New Jersey, Georgia, and New York. Upon discharge, he was appointed Superintendent of Schools in Bordentown, N.J., a position he held until his retirement in 1956, a 37-year tenure which is probably a record not only for New Jersey but for the U.S. as a whole! In retirement, he has been active in community affairs, serving as Commissioner, Deputy Mayor and Director of Finance in Bordentown, and in education organizations, several of which he helped to found. A strong interest in sports led to a 30-year career as a football official and as a leader in organizing interscholastic sports in New Jersey.

Like Robert, ESTA HERR has been an active member of the Association, longer than just about anyone else beginning with her attendance as a teenager at the first one in 1906 and having missed only a few since. She also served as Necrologist for many years and is now Honorary Vice President. She is in good health physically and mentally except for failing eyesight which has curtailed her activities somewhat. She maintains her own apartment at the Landis Retirement Homes near Lititz, Pa. and loves to entertain. She delights in her two grandchildren and two great-grandsons.

Esta is a true-blue Lancaster Countian, having lived there all her life -- and in the same house 72 years, where both she and her only child, Sara Harting, were born! She graduated from Akron (Pa.) High School and Millersville Normal School (now University). After serving as teacher and principal for 5 years, she quit to marry Robert P. Herr, a banker for over 50 years at Conestoga National Bank in Lancaster before his death in 1972. Later she resumed as teacher and administrator at her alma mater, then retired "permanently" in the mid-30's. Or so she thought. During World War II, she returned to junior high teaching on request and kept at it for the next 20 years, retiring at 70 in 1962, but continuing as a substitute for 5 more years. She has always been active in her church and community activities.

We honor these senior members and wish them many more productive years!
